Port of Houston Authority Port Commission Public Meeting

A public meeting of the Port Commission of the Port of Houston Authority of Harris County, Texas was convened on May 25, 2021 at 9:15 a.m., via Cisco WebEx. The following commissioners, staff, and counsel were present:

Ric Campo, Chairman Wendy Cloonan, Commissioner Dean Corgey, Commissioner Cheryl Creuzot, Commissioner Stephen DonCarlos, Commissioner Clyde Fitzgerald, Commissioner Roy Mease, Commissioner Roger Guenther, Executive Director Erik Eriksson, Chief Legal Officer Tom Heidt, Chief Operating Officer J. Kent Friedman, outside counsel

Chairman Campo began his opening remarks by noting that Infrastructure Week was acknowledged and celebrated at the previous Port Commission meeting, adding that the importance of continued investment in infrastructure improvements for the efficient movement of freight had recently been highlighted: a groundbreaking at the Beltway 8 property marked the start of work on a critical area for dredge placement for the Houston Ship Channel Expansion Improvement Project (Project 11), and an op-ed piece had been released and distributed across several media outlets which stressed the need for infrastructure.

Chairman Campo gave a quick update on Project 11. Progress continued with the completion of several designs and constructability review by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Army Corps). Several specific development tasks were advanced related to relocating pipelines, oil facilities, and addressing minor real estate issues. The Port Authority remained on track to sign the Project Partnership Agreement with the Army Corps at the end of June 2021. Finally, on May 26, 2021 the Project 11 team would conduct the third "Industry Day," a continuation of outreach to the dredging industry to ensure the supplier base maintained full awareness of the project schedule and would be ready to efficiently propose on Project 11 contracts.

Chairman Campo highlighted other events at the Port Authority. The previous week the Port Authority celebrated National Police Week, a weeklong recognition established in 1962 to pay tribute to law enforcement officers who lost their lives in the line of duty. The week concluded with Peace Officers Memorial Day on May 15, which was observed by displaying the flag at half-staff on government buildings. The observance held special meaning for Port Authority Police officers who risk their lives to protect and serve the people and commerce of the port.

Chairman Campo stressed the Port Authority's drive for excellence in environment and sustainability leadership. The Sustainability Action Team was executing its plan to engage stakeholders to gauge opportunities for additional projects that could support the Port Authority's sustainability goal through environmental, social, and governance (ESG) initiatives.

The Port Authority has invited approximately 80 stakeholders across a broad spectrum of interests, including neighboring citizens and community organizations, environmental advocates, industry ship channel users, beneficial cargo owners, vessel owners, and sustainability focused representatives of the city, county, and academia.

Chairman Campo continued: the first round of workshops had the primary purpose of listening to stakeholders while evaluating dozens of ideas in the ESG areas, with the aim to understand better where the Port Authority could take the lead, where it would be an effective partner, and where it could offer its support. The team would collate the firstround findings and conduct a second-round workshop to coalesce around possible recommendations. Finally, the team would review the outputs with a smaller board of senior advisors to validate the recommendations before reporting to the Port Commission at the July 2021 Community Relations Committee meeting.

Chairman Campo concluded his remarks by encouraging all present to honor and mourn the military personnel who had died during the performance of their military duties while serving in the United States Armed Forces during the forthcoming Memorial Day weekend.

(2021-0525-01) Chairman Campo called for a motion to approve the minutes of the April 27, 2021 Port Commission meeting. Commissioner Mease moved for approval, seconded by Commissioner Corgey. The minutes were approved as written.

(2021-0525-02) Roger Guenther, Executive Director, presented a summary of selected April 2021 operating results as follows.

- Following a strong month in March, operation activity across Port Authority public facilities remained solid through April.
- Only a year ago, container volume began to pull back rapidly due to the pandemic, followed by a few lean months of double-digit declines. It was not surprising, therefore, that April 2021 exceeded the prior April with an increase of 25% in TEU activity.
- The increase was driven by strong import demand, but export containers showed a solid rebound.
- Total container volume for the year was up three percent over the prior year.

- General cargo activity through the Port Authority's multipurpose facilities was up more than seven percent over the prior year.
- There were reports of strong projections of steel activity for the month of May.
- Imports continued to trend upward and were recovering from 2020.
- Overall, cargo through Port Authority facilities was solid.
- The maiden voyage of the *ONE Moderna*, expected to arrive on June 13, 2021, marked a new service.
- This fifth direct, all-water Asian service was calling on the Port Authority with vessels in the 7,000 TEU capacity range.
- The new service provided for new business and new opportunities for import and export for the Port Authority's beneficial cargo owners and shippers through the terminals.

Mr. Guenther remarked that the Port Authority continued to make the investments in the capital plan needed to stay ahead of the demand. The previous day the Port Authority issued a "notice to proceed" to the contractor for construction of the Wharf 6 project at the Bayport Container Terminal. The project supported the continued growth of container activity and larger vessels calling on Port Authority facilities.

Mr. Guenther noted that many had asked about the status of telecommuters returning to the office, and remarked that a phased return to the Executive Office building had begun on a limited schedule. Staff was taking a methodical approach to returning so that safety protocols and social distancing were maintained. More employees would return in mid-June.

Finally, Mr. Guenther discussed the continued progress being made on one of the Port Authority's strategic priorities: fostering diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) within the organization, to enable it to become a best place to work. The Port Authority ramped up its DEI efforts beginning last summer as the need to communicate had been heightened by the events of the prior year, including the death of George Floyd one year ago that day. Roundtable discussions were held and attended by 122 employees, mandatory training on inclusive leadership for senior staff was rolled out, and an organizational training program was being worked on. A cross-functional DEI action team had led many more efforts on that front, including the ongoing development of a DEI plan.

Mr. Guenther recognized that the importance of DEI went beyond the Port Authority's internal culture. As a leader of commerce and economic activity in the most diverse city in the U.S., the Port Authority had a duty to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion through the region. The results of the disparity study conducted in 2020 revealed the need for the Port Authority to address DEI externally through greater equity in its contracting. An initiative to create greater opportunity for minority- and women-owned businesses to work with the Port Authority had been started. The initiative included reforming the Port Commission's Procurement and Small Business Development Task Force as the Business Equity Committee, adopting a new MWBE Development Policy with aggressive goals for participation, and the creation of a strategic marketing plan to get the word out to the community.

Mr. Guenther stated that the steps taken so far had given the Port Authority a running start for two big leaps to be taken that day. First, a draft DEI Position Statement was on the agenda for adoption. It was a forward-looking public declaration and internal mantra capturing the vision for DEI at the Port Authority. Second, a Business Equity Division was added to the Port Authority with a new Chief Officer that would report directly to Mr. Guenther. The new division would provide vision, leadership, and guidance for the Port Authority's diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts, with a focus on promoting equity and enhancing opportunity for all, both internally and externally.

Mr. Guenther emphasized that the new division would elevate the profile of DEI at the Port Authority, ensuring that it had the organizational weight and leadership needed to produce meaningful and sustainable change. The new division would absorb what was the Small Business Department, while education outreach would be relocated into the Community Relations Department, marrying up the maritime education program and community engagement efforts.

Commissioner Fitzgerald inquired as to length that the new cranes would be able to reach; Mr. Guenther believed the number was twenty-two wide, adding that these would be the tallest cranes in the fleet. Commissioner Fitzgerald noted that he had heard a vessel recently unloaded 6,000 TEUs at the Port Authority, and inquired as to whether that was a record; Mr. Guenther was not sure.

Commissioner Corgey asked about the beam length on the ships that would be serviced by the new cranes. Mr. Guenther explained that everything was being designed around the Neopanamax vessels, which were 160 feet in beam, but he thought the cranes may be even longer.

Chairman Campo noted that volumes were up 3%, and wondered how long it would take for the supply chain to get back to normal pre-pandemic levels. He added that items such as lumber were currently in short supply; prices had doubled. Mr. Guenther replied that the belief was that it would carry on through the end of the year. He added that not only was the import market going to be strong, but export of petrochemicals was ramping up.

Chairman Campo lamented that the news was not better: prices were spiking, which was difficult for the end-consumer. Mr. Guenther remarked, however, that it was good for Houston as there was tremendous demand and the Port Authority was able to handle the volume. Chairman Campo concluded that it was good for business, bad for consumers.

(2021-0525-03) Appearances

(a) Chairman Campo recognized Kristina Zatopek, East Harris County Empowerment Council, who addressed the Port Commission.

Ms. Zatopek petitioned the Port Commission to deny the pipeline license to Intercontinental Terminals Company LLC (ITC) that was on the agenda as Item 110. She stated that ITC had not been a good neighbor and should not be rewarded for continuous bad behavior: ITC had a long history of EPA infringements and failed inspections.

Ms. Zatopek continued by noting that ITC had not changed its direction since the explosion at its facility in March of 2019. ITC received Environmental Protection Agency High Priority Clean Air Act (CAA) violations every quarter from April 2020 through June 2021 and a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) violation in 2020.

Ms. Zatopek stressed that the Port Authority's commitment to its DEI impact should weigh on its consideration, taking into account that ITC was in a 40% people-of-color (POC) community.

Mr. Guenther explained that the request was for a routine license. The Port Authority did not view the license as a reward, and there had been no issues that constituted any reason to deny the license.

Chairman Campo clarified that the Port Authority was the non-federal sponsor of the channel and operated the public docks. The leasing of land and granting pipeline licenses was a perfunctory part of its job; the Port Authority was not an entity that enforced environmental law, and the activity of other entities along the channel was not under the purview of the Port Authority. The Port Authority's job was not to decide if a company was good or bad when considering access to public resources, including pipelines.

Commissioner Corgey remarked that it was the Port Authority's responsibility to create and promote jobs, and denying a pipeline license would go against said responsibility.

Commissioner DonCarlos inquired as to whether the license was for a new or existing pipeline. Mr. Byrnes clarified that the license was for a new pipeline to be constructed along a Port Terminal Railway Association (PTRA) rail spur.

Commissioner Mease asked if staff would inspect the pipeline once it was completed. Mr. Byrnes assured Commissioner Mease that both PTRA and the Port Authority would inspect the completed pipeline.

(b) Chairman Campo recognized Stephanie Thomas, Public Citizen, who addressed the Port Commission.

Ms. Thomas offered comments on the Port Authority's DEI Plan. She appreciated the part stating the Port Authority was committed to doing what was right within the organization and the community: it was a good first step.

Ms. Thomas commented on the ITC pipeline request. She understood that licensing was a perfunctory part of the Port Authority's job, but felt there was room to consider what was in the best interest for those seeking jobs as well as those in the community.

Chairman Campo thought there was room to have a broad conversation within the ESG conversations about the Port Authority's role and responsibilities regarding its licensing. However, until there was a review of that role it was difficult to change the current policy.

(c) Chairman Campo recognized Bay Scoggin, TexPIRG, who addressed the Port Commission.

Mr. Scoggin had done a lot of research on buses, and he had heard the Port Authority was looking to acquire a new bus for the Bayport Container Terminal. He reported that zero emission buses reached cost parity: each electric bus purchased would net a savings of over \$200,000 during the life of the vehicle. Although the initial cost of electric buses was higher, they had 70% - 90% fewer moving pieces and therefore required significantly less operations and maintenance costs. Coupled with the savings in fuel, the overall lifetime cost of the bus was less than that of a normal one.

Mr. Scoggin highlighted ancillary benefits, such as reduced air pollution. He noted that exhaust fumes from regular buses polluted the direct area around and inside the bus. Additionally, there were significant funding opportunities for the purchase of electric buses, which would compound the savings of electric vehicles. He was happy to pass along such opportunities: every new electric bus purchased in the future would be value-added.

Chairman Campo suggested Mr. Scoggin join the sustainability group and advocate for the use of electric vehicles. The question for the Port Authority was how viable the technology was at present. Mr. Guenther added that the Port Authority had electric yard mules that it was currently testing, and it was evaluating the total cost. He was open to looking into the availability and use of electric buses.

Chairman Campo remarked that the Port Authority would be publishing an ESG report later in the year.

Commissioner Corgey felt that Mr. Scoggin raised excellent points and his comment were well received.

(2021-0525-04) Chairman Campo introduced agenda Item F1 and asked for any comments from the Commissioners.

Commissioner Cloonan was appreciative of the strategy to create a new division to put meat on the DEI Plan.

(2021-0525-05) RCA F1 was presented, moved by Commissioner Corgey, seconded by Commissioner Fitzgerald. Chairman Campo, and Commissioners Cloonan, Corgey, Creuzot, DonCarlos, Fitzgerald, and Mease voted Aye. Nays none. MOTION PASSED.

(2021-0525-06) Chairman Campo recognized Mr. Heidt to provide a report of selected Executive Division agenda items.

Mr. Heidt remarked that Item F2 was for the approval of eleven law firms to advise and assist on future debt financing, in anticipation that the Port Commission may authorize and approve the issuance of debt to finance costs related to Project 11.

(2021-0525-07) RCA F2 was presented, moved by Commissioner Corgey, seconded by Commissioner Creuzot. Chairman Campo, and Commissioners Cloonan, Corgey, Creuzot, DonCarlos, Fitzgerald, and Mease voted Aye. Nays none. RCA F2 PASSED.

(2021-0525-08) Chairman Campo recognized Mr. Heidt to provide a report of selected Commercial agenda items.

Mr. Heidt commented on agenda Item G1, which was to amend a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Panama Canal Authority and the Port Authority. The MOU had been in place since 2003 and was important due to the exchange of data and joint marketing done between the parties.

(2021-0525-09) RCA G1 was presented, moved by Commissioner DonCarlos, seconded by Commissioner Cloonan. Chairman Campo, and Commissioners Cloonan, Corgey, Creuzot, DonCarlos, Fitzgerald, and Mease voted Aye. Nays none. RCA G1 PASSED.

(2021-0525-10) RCA G2 was presented, moved by Commissioner DonCarlos, seconded by Commissioner Cloonan. Chairman Campo, and Commissioners Cloonan, Corgey, Creuzot, DonCarlos, Fitzgerald, and Mease voted Aye. Nays none. RCA G2 PASSED.

(2021-0525-11) RCA G3 was presented, moved by Commissioner DonCarlos, seconded by Commissioner Cloonan. Chairman Campo, and Commissioners Cloonan, Corgey, Creuzot, DonCarlos, Fitzgerald, and Mease voted Aye. Nays none. RCA G3 PASSED.

(2021-0525-12) Chairman Campo recognized Mr. Heidt to provide a report of selected Finance agenda items.

Mr. Heidt remarked on agenda Item H1, a contract for a property and casualty insurance broker of record. The broker helped to develop the insurance program, create specifications for bids, and negotiate pricing for annual premiums. Item H2 was similar to Item F2, except it pertained to 26 investment banking and debt underwriting firms that could be used for future debt financing requirements. The final team, comprised of the legal and underwriting members, would be brought before the Port Commission for review and approval.

(2021-0525-13) RCA H1 was presented, moved by Commissioner Mease, seconded by Commissioner Corgey. Chairman Campo, and Commissioners Cloonan, Corgey, Creuzot, DonCarlos, Fitzgerald, and Mease voted Aye. Nays none. RCA H1 PASSED.

(2021-0525-14) RCA H2 was presented, moved by Commissioner Mease, seconded by Commissioner Corgey. Chairman Campo, and Commissioners Cloonan, Corgey, Creuzot, DonCarlos, Fitzgerald, and Mease voted Aye. Nays none. RCA H2 PASSED.

(2021-0525-15) Chairman Campo recognized Mr. Heidt to provide a report of selected Infrastructure agenda items.

Mr. Heidt explained agenda Items I1 and I2 were associated with the \$80 million grant for the rehabilitation of Barbours Cut Terminal. Item I1 pertained to the planning and design for reconstruction of 87 acres of container yard while Item I2 pertained to the design for the rehabilitation of Wharves 4, 5, and 6.

Mr. Heidt continued: Item I3 was for the next step in the Port Authority's facility inspection and condition assessment program (FICAP) program. The item would start the evaluation process for the Port Authority's electrical and communications systems at the Bayport Container Terminal. Items 16, 17, and 18 were for the approval of memoranda of understandings with the Army Corps for maintenance dredging at Port Authority berths. These would allow for "piggybacking" off the Army Corps' dredging activities, to allow the Port Authority to save money on dredging.

Background:

On July 3, 2003, the Port Authority and the Panama Canal Authority entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). By Minute No. 2011-0426-20, Port Commission approved amending and renewing the MOV for the first time, and it amended and renewed once again in 2016 by Minute No. 2016-0322-05.

Staff Evaluation/Justification:

The MOU states the parties' mutual interest in cooperating to generate new business by promoting the allwater route between Asia and the Pacific Rim, and the Gulf Coast, via the Panama Canal. Such new business helps to increase both regions' economic growth as well as increase the revenues of the Port Authority and the Panama Canal. To accomplish the foregoing, the MOU provided that the parties would elect to undertake joint marketing activities and to share information regarding operations, engineering, marketing, and technology.

Background:

By Minute No. 2018-0626-28, the Port Commission awarded a two-year contract to Home Depot U.S.A., Inc. (Home Depot) in the amount of \$300,000 for the purchase of miscellaneous hardware and construction supplies for Barbours Cut Terminal, Bayport Container Terminal, and Turning Basin Terminal. The Port Authority operates a total of three maintenance shops that are responsible for building and facility maintenance for these terminals. These shops often engage in repairs to buildings, as well as relocation and construction of office spaces. Supplies such as drywall, plywood, lumber, and fittings are needed to successfully complete this work.

Staff Evaluation/Justification:

Procuring miscellaneous hardware and construction supplies such as drywall, plywood, lumber, and fittings through the U.S. Communities Government Purchasing Alliance is the method that both satisfies competitive purchase requirements and provides the best value to the Port Authority. The Director of Procurement Services has determined that the use of this procurement program provides the best value for this best value determination and purchase.

The Port Authority currently owns two 26-passenger buses and one 12-passenger bus, both in operation at Bayport Container Terminal. These units are used daily to transport longshoremen to and from parking lots and wharves. One 26-passenger bus (unit 2156) was damaged on March 7, 2021, resulting in a total loss. The Port Authority is currently renting one 26-passenger bus until a replacement has been purchased.

Staff Evaluation/Justification:

Staff has compared prices for passenger buses obtained from non-Houston-Galveston Area Council local dealerships and Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) providers. The Director of Procurement Services has determined that procuring this vehicle through the H-GAC cooperative purchase program is the method that both satisfies competitive purchase requirements and provides the best value to the Port Authority.

The H-GAC website lists several pre-approved vendors. Staff has reviewed the passenger bus specifications from H-GAC providers and determined that Rush Bus Centers is the vendor with the best price for this unit and meets the Port Authority's requirements. Rush Bus Centers pricing for the selected model was reviewed and approved by H-GAC.

Accordingly, staff requests the Port Commission approve this best value determination and purchase.

Background:

PayFactors Group LLC ("Payfactors") was previously selected as the vendor of choice for a three-year contract at \$15,000 per year that supplies compensation technology and data management software to provide current competitive market analysis for positions within the Port Authority.

The Port Authority has utilized PayFactors software for the past three years to perform market pricing analysis for positions within the Port Authority. PayFactors software maintains current salary survey data on thousands of jobs that can be used to analyze the competitiveness of our base compensation.

The Port Authority's existing agreement with PayFactors allows the Port Authority to analyze existing as well as newly-created positions. Currently, the Port Authority has in excess of 175 positions that are analyzed and compared for market competitiveness.

PayFactors has now offered to extend the same locked-in price of \$15,000 per year for a five-year period beginning November 1, 2021 and ending October 31, 2026.

Staff Evaluation/Justification:

PayFactor's proposal would continue to provide access to its Compensation database platform and services at the same price that was selected following a competitive selection process in 2018.

Staff recommends the Port Commission approve a contract to PayFactors. It should be noted that PayFactors Group LLC will be merging with and becoming a subsidiary of PayScale Inc. but will continue to operate as a wholly owned subsidiary.
